

# David G. Ouellet Seaman, United States Navy 1944-1967

David George Ouellet was born in Newton, Massachusetts, on June 13, 1944, son of Chester J. and Elizabeth E. Ouellet. He graduated from Hardy School in Wellesley and in 1958 attended Wellesley Junior High School. He subsequently was employed by the Alfred Fisher Trucking Company of Wellesley. On July 28, 1964, he enlisted in the U.S. Navy at Boston, Massachusetts, and entered recruit training at the Naval Training Center, Great Lakes, Illinois. Completing his training in October 1964, he joined Assault Craft Division TWELVE, and while attached to that division served in Vietnam for five months in 1965.

From June through August 1966, SN Ouellet attended river patrol boat training at the Naval Schools Command, Vallejo, California. Follow on training was at the Naval Amphibious Base, Coronado, California. On September 21, 1966, he reported for duty with River Squadron FIVE where he was attached to My Tho Detachment 532 at the time of his death on March 6, 1967. He was posthumously awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor for heroic action on the Mekong River. He was also awarded the Purple Heart for wounds received in enemy action.



The 22 stars represent the age of Seaman Ouellet at the time he was killed in action in Vietnam. The white stars on a blue field represent the Congressional Medal of Honor which was awarded to him posthumously. The white stripes indicate Seaman Ouellet's rate.

#### THE HISTORY OF USS QUELLET

USS OUELLET (FF 1077) is the first ship of the United States Navy to bear the name of Seaman David George Quellet. It is a Knox Class Frigate specifically designed to locate and destroy enemy submarines. OUELLET's keel was laid at Avondale Shipyard Incorporated in Westwego, Louisiana on January 15, 1969. She was commissioned at Charleston Naval Shipyard, South Carolina, on December 12.

OUELLET arrived at her homeport in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii on April 15, 1971, with her first deployment to the Western Pacific commencing on January 27, 1972. OUELLET twice came under hostile fire during this deployment, however, no casualties were sustained. OUELLET's gun accurately fired thousands of rounds against enemy positions in North Vietnam.

During ceremonies re-establishing the U. S. Third Fleet on February 1, 1973, USS OUELLET became the first Third Fleet flagship since World War II.

USS OUELLET made her second deployment to the Western Pacific from May through September 1973. She began her first regular overhaul September 14, 1974, with completion on June 3, 1975. OUELLET was selected as the CINCPACFLT flagship for the U. S. Navy's 200th birthday ceremonies. OUELLET completed two more Western Pacific deployments prior to overhaul in late 1978. Regular overhaul was completed mid 1979 with three Western Pacific deployments to follow commencing September 1980, April 1982, and October 1983 respectively.

OUELLET began her third major overhaul in February 1985. She received extensive upgrades to her gun mount, CIWS, and SNAP II computers. In 1986 OUELLET was again preparing for a Western Pacific deployment. OUELLET deployed for her eighth time in April 1987. This deployment took her with Battle Group Delta to the Indian Ocean and the Gulf of Oman for the Iran cirsis. She returned to Pearl Harbor on October 5, 1987.

OUELLET made her ninth deployment in mid-December 1988, returning May 1989 and departing again September 1989 for Pacific Exercises 1989. Upon return to Pearl Harbor in November 1989, she went into drydock, refloating in February 1990. After extensive preparations and an exhaustive inspection cycle, OUELLET departed in August 1990 to Central America in support of Law Enforcement Operations during which she transited the Panama Canal. After returning in November 1990, OUELLET was awarded the Battle "E" for overall excellence, and the Joint Meritorious Unit Citation. In June 1991, OUELLET participated in Pacific Training of Midshipmen 1991, I, II and III and Anti-Submarine Operations 1991. OUELLET made her tenth deployment to various South Pacific islands, Japan, Indonesia, Singapore, Korea, and Australia to commemorate the 50th Anniversary of the Battle of Coral Sea, from 25 March - 24 July 1992. From 22 January - 26 February 1993, OUELLET made her final deployment to San Francisco, CA, and Everett, WA, and participated in a CNO project in Nanoose Harbor, Canada.

OUELLET is now proudly displaying the Battle Efficiency "E" Award and all departmental awards for consistent superior performance during the last competitive cycle (Dec '90 - Dec '92). She decommissions a winner!

In a letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Chester J. Quellet of 3 Lake rd., Sec. of the Navy Paul S. Ignatius said a new ship will be named after their son.

Ouellet, the second Navy man to receive the nation's highest bonor in Vietnam, was killed in action Mar. 6.

A forward machine gunner on a river patrol bost in the Mekong Delta, Ouellet saw an enemy grenade fall abourd. He ran the length of the boat, shouting for his shipmates to take cover, then threw himself between the captain and grenade, absorbing the full blast.

The medal, presented by Ignatius, was received by his purents as three brothers. five sisters and several memhers of the pairol boat crew

#### REAR ADMIRAL WILLIAM ANDREW RETZ UNITED STATES NAVY



Rear Admiral Retz was born in Blauvelt, New York and attended the University of New Mexico at Albuquerque as an NROTC Scholarship student. President of Phi Delta Theta Fraternity and Commander of the Brigade of Midshipmen, he

graduated with a degree in Mechanical Engineering and was commissioned in June 1963. He later earned a Master of Science degree from George Washington University.

Rear Admiral Retz' first assignment was as Main Propulsion Officer in USS TAYLOR (DD 468), in which he made three Western Pacific deployments. Subsequent at-sea assignments included duty as Operations Officer, USS BORIE (DD 704), assignment with the River Patrol Forces (TF 116) in Vietnam; Executive Officer, USS AINSWORTH (FF 1090), and Commanding Officer USS STUMP (DD 978). The highlight of Rear Admiral Retz' sea duty was as Commander, Destroyer Squadron TWENTY-TWO. Throughout these tours Rear Admiral Retz served in the Atlantic, Pacific and Mediterranean Theaters, involved in such incidents as the 1973 Middle-East crisis; Operation GAME WARDEN in Vietnam; and the hostage crisis off Beirut. While in command of Destroyer Squadron TWENTY-TWO, he was deeply involved in TOMAHAWK cruise missile tests in addition to Battle Group Operations.

His shore duty has included tours as student, Cruiser-Destroyer Force Engineering School and Naval Destroyer School (graduating both with distinction); Naval War College, Newport, Rhode Island; and Placement Officer, Bureau of Naval Personnel, Washington, DC.

Additionally, Rear Admiral Retz has served several staff tours, including duty as Company Officer and Performance Officer, U.S. Naval Academy; Flag Secretary and Aide to Commander, Amphibious Group TWO; Deputy Director, Surface Warfare Division, Office of the Chief of Naval Operations (Surface Warfare); Head, Officer Community Management Section and Deputy Director, Military Personnel Policy Division, Office of the Deputy Chief of Naval Operations (Manpower, Personnel and Training); and Executive Assistant to the Chief of Naval Personnel.

Rear Admiral Retz assumed duties as Deputy Director for Operations, United States Central Command in September 1987. His responsibilities encompassed Persian Gulf operations, including EARNEST WILL escort operations as well as Operations NIMBLE ARCHER and PRAYING MANTIS, which were U.S. retaliatory strikes during the Iran/Iraq War. He completed this tour in the spring of 1989 and attended the National Defense University Capstone course enroute to his first flag assignment as Director, Total Force Programming/Manpower Division (OP 12). Subsequently, he was assigned as Assistant Chief of Naval Personnel for Military Personnel Policy and Career Progression (PERS 2). Rear Admiral Retz assumed command of Naval Surface Group Middle Pacific and Naval Base, Pearl Harbor in July 1992.

Rear Admiral Retz awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal, Legion of Merit (with two Gold Stars), Bronze Star (with Combat "V"), Purple Heart, Meritorious Service Medal (with Gold Star), Navy Commendation Medal, Combat Action Ribbon, Presidential Unit Citation, Meritorious Unit Citation and various campaign and service awards.

Rear Admiral Retz and his wife Julia reside in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. They have five grown children on the mainland.

for service as set forth in the following Citation

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty while serving with River Section 532, in combat against the enemy in the Republic of Vietnam. As the forward machine gunner on River Patrol Boat (PBR) 124, which was on patrol on the Mekong River during the early evening hours of 6 March 1967, Seaman Ouellet observed suspicious activity near the river bank, alerted his Boat Captain, and recommended movement of the boat to the area to investigate. While the PBR was making a high-speed run along the river bank, Seaman Ouellet spotted an incoming enemy grenade falling toward the boat. He immediately left the protected position of his gun mount and ran aft for the full length of the speeding boat, shouting to his fellow crewmembers to take cover. Observing the Boat Captain standing unprotected on the boat, Seaman Ouellet bounded onto the engine compartment cover, and pushed the Boat Captain down to safety. In the split second that followed the grenade's landing, and in the face of certain death, Seaman Ouellet fearlessly placed himself between the deadly missile and his shipmates, courageously absorbing most of the blast fragments with his own body in order to protect his shipmates from injury and death. His extraordinary heroism and his selfless and courageous actions on behalf of his comrades at the expense of his own life were in the finest traditions of the United States Naval Service.
